At Wendy's bead embroidery workshop you will make a sumptuous cuff using silk shibori ribbon. Shibori is a Japanese dye technique that creates

beautiful shading. The cuff will be embellished with bead embroidery



techniques. Book early to choose your colour as silk will be dyed by an artisan especially for this course. You have a choice of making "River" in a beautiful turquoise colour way or "Carnival" in rich oranges and purples. Limit 12. Cost: \$140 (\$95 tuition + \$45 kit).
